2014 Annual Meeting

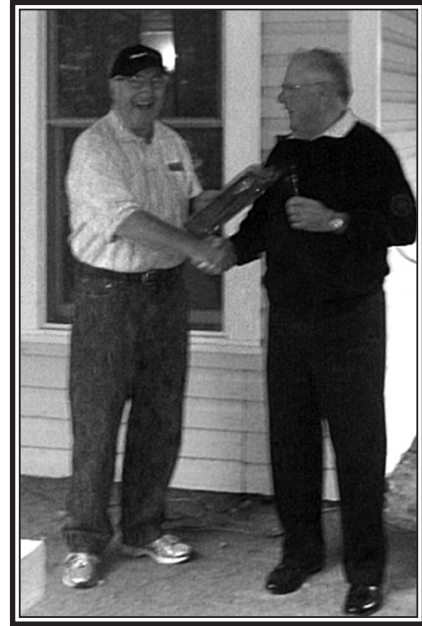

NAVIGATIONAL COMMITTEE REPORT

Greetings to all, members and non-members alike! Check out the forecast, we have some beautiful weather coming our way and all the better for us to enjoy these beautiful lakes we call the Fulton Chain. These beautiful and CLEAN lakes provide such a wide variety of activities for us to enjoy, so get out and make use!

What's new you ask – well the Town of Inlet has been chosen by the State DEC to host one of their 20 new Boat Wash Station. This is part of their initiative to mitigate the introduction of invasive aquatic species to our lakes.

Fishing, just one of those magnificent opportunities provided by these lakes. The State will again be stocking our lakes this season, you can find more information at this DEC website www.dec.ny.gov/outdoor/7739.html and don't forget, use only certified bait. For more information on baitfish go to www.dec.ny.gov/outdoor/47282.html. Do you have some children or grandchildren to entertain? If they are younger than 16 years of age, they do not require a fishing license so take advantage of this great opportunity to introduce someone to a lifetime outdoor activity.

“Respect” – regardless of the activity you're enjoying remember to respect not only this precious natural resource but other too. When you're boating become familiar with and respect the navigational laws. Motor boats of any size can be very powerful and tragic outcomes can happen quickly. Let's make sure everyone knows how to safely operate their boat and they know the local

navigational laws (refer the speed limit summary below). But let's not stop there; we should all be vigilant, if you spot ongoing reckless or unsafe activity call 911 they will direct the appropriate sheriff's patrol or agency to respond. This level of vigilance and respect will provide the greatest level of enjoyment for all.

Looking for some resources? Here's a convenient place to get started, check out our website www.FultonChainOfLakesAssociation.org, here you'll find downloadable copies of both the *New York State Boaters Guide* and our *Navigation Information* brochure detailing information on safety and regional activities, resources and regulations.

Boater Safety courses will again be held by both the Herkimer County (315) 867-1167 and Hamilton County (518) 548-3113 Sheriff's Departments, contact them for further details. These courses are a great way to introduce youngsters as young as 10 to the independent enjoyment and respect of safe boating. Please keep in mind the following restrictions on the use of the increasingly popular Personal Watercrafts, generically known as WaveRunners. The minimum operator age is 14 and ALL operators, regardless of age, must have completed a boating safety course. Operation within the Town of Webb is patrolled and permitted only between the hours of 9am and 6pm daily.

Time to get out and enjoy your lakes, remember – RESPECT, “Preserve and Protect”

WATER QUALITY COMMITTEE REPORT

The Fulton Chain water quality-monitoring program continued during 2104. The waters of the Fulton Chain of Lakes were sampled and tested from Old Forge Pond to Inlet. The purpose of this program is to collect data over a long period of time and keep a watchful eye out for any significant changes that may occur. The water quality monitoring takes into account chemical, physical and biological parameters. Thus far the water appears to be of good quality. In 2014, pH ranged from 7.19-7.36 pH units and the alkalinity averaged 14 mg/l. The scheduled routine E. coli (indicators of fecal pollution) tests produced low levels of bacterial density and ranged from less than 1 organism to 16 organisms per 100 milliliters, with an average of 3 organisms per 100 milliliters. New York State standards for bathing beaches require fecal coliform levels be less than 200 per 100 milliliters. However, during random grab sampling, of the Old Forge pond several bacteriological samples showed higher than normal bacterial counts. Follow up samples were taken at intervals during the summer and bacterial counts dropped significantly. These higher levels of bacteria may be linked to duck and goose activity in the Old Forge Pond. It is important to discourage visitors from feeding water fowl.

The Water Quality Committee recognizes how important the Town of Webb's Septic Dye Testing Program is to the health of our lakes and applauds these efforts. This program helps to detect failing septic systems that could contribute bacteria, nutrients and other pollutants to our watershed.

INVASIVE SPECIES SUB-COMMITTEE

Our Water Quality Committee continues to keep a watchful eye on the presence of invasive plant species such as Eurasian water milfoil. We are grateful for the Paul Smith's College Watershed

Stewardship Program that has been keeping a watchful eye over our public boat launch sites on the Fulton Chain. In addition, the Water Quality Committee will continue to conduct surveys looking for re-growth in the areas that the FCLA has previously harvested Eurasian water milfoil in 5th through 7th Lakes. We also have divers who volunteer their time surveying the lake bottoms looking for any invasive plant growth. This year we will continue to explore other grant opportunities and control techniques in our fight to control the spread of invasive species in our lakes.

The Town of Inlet has been chosen to host a boat wash, one of over 20 planned in the Adirondack Park. The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation plans on getting the Inlet wash up and running before Memorial Day with the intention of finding and removing invasive species from boats traveling between lakes before they are launched. The recently adopted state budget for 2015/16 contains \$1 million to help fight aquatic invasive species in the Adirondack region. Governor Cuomo signed a bill in September of 2014 that prohibits the launch of watercraft in New York State without taking "reasonable precautions" to prevent the spread of aquatic invasive species. *The New York Boaters Guide to Cleaning, Drying, and Disinfecting Boating Equipment* is available at: www.dec.ny.gov/docs/fish_pdf/boatdisinfect.pdf

In conclusion, our studies have shown that the Fulton Chain of Lakes is a complex system containing a diverse array of plants, animals, and microorganisms, which interact with their environment that in turn is impacted by the geological formations of its watershed and the activities of all its citizens. The quality and

DYE TESTING REPORT

Peg Carroll – Town of Webb Code Enforcement

During the Summer of 2014, I completed 235 dye tests with no catastrophic septic system failures observed. Several minor plumbing issues were noted which the owners quickly resolved.

My visits include commercial businesses, rentals, year round as well as seasonal residences. Some locations take more time to test due to geography, boat only access and those places that have multiple septic systems on site. Many sites are vacant, for sale or not used in summer months. Even if I could gain entry to those locations, the test would not be valid due to no load on the system. When no one is available to allow entry, I leave a business card with an office number to call and schedule at their convenience. This method has proven fairly effective.

There is one more success story I would like to share, other than no failures found. I had the pleasant opportunity to engage a lovely family vacationing for the first time in our area. Grandparents, parents, children of all ages....While I performed my test I was asked numerous questions regarding procedures, dye test program, FCLA and, and....! “Where is the tank? We don't see it! How does the system work? How long has FCLA performed this service? Why don't other New York State lakes perform this test?” Who knew so many could fit into such a small bathroom! So amazed and pleased with our pristine resources, this family has vowed to return for all their summer vacations to follow. Do I find this encounter indicative of our future? Yes, I do!

Now, certainly, that is a success story. We are doing something right that has long, long lasting results to preserve our natural resources. We are unique. I trust our non aggressive approach assures favored results.

I remain intrigued, dedicated and proud to continue educational involvement and service with the dye test program. Thank you.

GOVERNMENT RELATIONS COMMITTEE

FCLA has successfully worked with our various governments: the Towns of Inlet and Webb, our counties of Hamilton and Herkimer, NYS and Federal Government since its beginning. In 1965, 3 years before FCLA was formed, FCLA's founders began efforts to alert the various governments to the contamination of the lakes and to try to find a remedies to solve the problem. Even then Senator Robert F. Kennedy sent a letter of support.

Every year since then our FCLA has had a close working relationship with our officials toward keeping our lakes clean and safe! In 1968, FCLA initiated the dye testing program in our towns and

continues to supports that effort every year working with the towns Zoning Officers.

The Town Supervisors are Honorary Members of FCLA's Board and frequently participate in our meetings. In the last few we have worked closely with both Towns on grants in a major effort to remove Eurasian Milfoil.

Every year the counties' Sheriffs update us on their efforts to keep the Lakes safe in the previous year and their plans for the next year. This effort has intensified the last couple of years as safety is an increasing concern.

WATERSHED STEWARDSHIP PROGRAM

2014 was the Watershed Stewardship Program's 4th year providing stewards at Fourth Lake. Coverage occurred 7 days per week from 7am to 4pm, with coverage beginning May 24th and ending September 1st. This was a significant increase over the 5 days per week coverage provided during the 2013 season. The stewards were funded for 2014 by the Great Lakes Restoration Initiative (GLRI) through an Environmental Protection Agency grant; funding for the 2015 season at Fourth Lake will be provided by GLRI through the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

Fourth Lake stewards educated 4,190 total visitors and inspected 1,563 total boats. 28 boats, or 2% of all inspections, were found to harbor one or more organisms. Out of 1,552 groups, 1,072 groups reported taking more than one aquatic invasive species (AIS) prevention method for their watercraft: 367 groups inspected their watercraft, 883 groups washed their watercraft, 278 groups drained their bilge, 10 groups emptied their bait buckets, 17 groups drained their live well,

8 groups disposed of unused bait, and 261 groups dried their watercraft. There was 1 case of bladderwort entering or exiting Fourth Lake, 5 cases of Eurasian watermilfoil, 10 cases of grass, 3 cases of native milfoil, 3 cases of unknown milfoil, 2 cases of pine needles, 2 cases of water chestnut, 1 case of zebra mussels, and 1 case of native pondweed. There were 8 total confirmed AIS removals from watercraft at Fourth Lake; 8 AIS entering the lake and zero AIS exiting the lake. Please follow the link:
